CONFERENCE AGENDA COMMITTEE

REPORT TO 2022 ANNUAL CONFERENCE

A) MOTIONS

Having examined the motions submitted for debate at the Annual Conference, the Conference Agenda Committee (CAC) finds those listed in the Order of Business to be appropriate matters for consideration by the Conference. No constitutional amendments were submitted for consideration.

B) ORDER OF BUSINESS

The Conference Agenda Committee recommends the order of business as set out in the accompanying agenda.

C) RIGHTS OF SPEAKERS

The Conference Agenda Committee recommends that during the appropriate plenary sessions of the Conference:

- Movers of motions and amendments be limited to a maximum of five minutes with persons seconding motions and any subsequent speakers limited to two minutes;
- ii. If in the course of the meeting it appears that the business may not be completed by the stipulated time, the Chairperson may recommend further restrictions on the time allowed to speakers for approval by the Annual Conference;
- iii. Speakers are allowed to make one contribution only on each item on the agenda, except for the mover of a motion who may exercise a right of reply limited to five minutes.

D) NATIONAL BOARD ELECTION

The National Board consists of twelve elected members – six of whom are elected in alternate years to serve a two-year term.

The AI Ireland constitution sets out the procedure for the election of the twelve ordinary members of the National Board as follows:

Article 13 (3) the twelve other positions on the National Board shall be filled by election to two panels containing six positions each. Elections to the panels shall take place in alternate years with elected members holding office for a two-year term. Elected members shall be eligible for re-election except that no elected member shall hold office for more than three terms consecutively.

As the number of candidates is equal to the number of vacancies no ballot is required. All candidates will, therefore, be deemed to be elected. The Constitution provides that any vacancies that may arise before the next Annual Conference shall be filled by co-option to the National Board.

E) ELECTION OF CONFERENCE AGENDA COMMITTEE 2021

Noting that:

Five candidates have been nominated for the three seats for ordinary members on the Conference Agenda Committee (CAC). FIRST TIME STANDING FOR ELECTION

LORRAINE SMYTH

Lorraine Smyth is an e-Enablement and Digital Solutions Manager within Corporate HSE. Lorraine holds an MSc of Science from UL and a Professional Diploma in Human right and equality IPA. Lorraine has a long history as a human rights defender first joining Amnesty at 16.

Lorraine is now a member of the Wexford branch of Amnesty where she has worked on many campaigns including both Yes campaigns, the Ibrahim Halawa and the Stardust campaign. Lorraine is a public servant for the last 21 years and has worked to change culture in the HSE working on the Anti-Bullying task force. The Steering group for the National Staff Engagement Forum and the Women in Leadership Forum. Lorraine is a member of the LGBTQI+ Allies.

Lorraine has an interest in patient centred care and was project lead on the Covid Patient Monitoring App, allowing patients remain at home while monitored during the Covid Pandemic. BRÍD CANNON — CHAIRPERSON

Bríd has been involved in the voluntary sector for over 11 years, in organisations, including the Free Legal Advice Centres, the National Youth Council of Ireland and also the Irish Association of Youth Orchestras which she chaired for 5 years. A law graduate of TCD, Brid is qualified at the New York Bar and also has over ten years' experience working in financial services.

She has a keen interest in the issues of corporate responsibility, and diversity and inclusiveness and the impact of financial services on the wider community. Bríd was first elected to the National Board in 2018 and was appointed as Chairperson in 2019.

KATIE O'HOULIHAN

She joined Amnesty as a university activist, taking an active role in advocacy and fundraising as part of DU Amnesty, Trinity's Amnesty society. In 2017, she directed Jailbreak, Ireland's largest student-run charity event. Since its inception, the event has collectively raised over €285,000 for Amnesty International and St. Vincent de Paul. In 2018, she represented Irish Youth in the annual Global Assembly, Amnesty's international governance meeting.

She has a keen interest in intersectionality, grassroots solutions and inclusive approaches to development frameworks.

Katie was first elected to the National Board in 2019.

RAZAN IBRAHEEM

Razan Ibraheem is an Irish-Syrian journalist and activist. She came to Ireland to do her Masters degree at the University of Limerick. Her deep sorrow for the tragic situation and the mass displacement in her homeland has led her to volunteer in Greece to help refugees. She gave a speech with the former UN Secretary-General Ban Ki-moon in Ireland. In 2016, she was invited by the UN to a high-level meeting in Geneva on global responsibility sharing for pathways for admission of Syrian refugees.

Razan is a journalist and editor with extensive expertise in investigative journalism and verifying content from social media. She focuses on misinformation and disinformation spread online. Her work has been featured in local and international media organizations and news websites. Razan is a regular contributor to various newspaper articles and current events programmes on Irish radio and TV.

She was awarded the International Woman of the Year by Irish Tatler in 2016.

Razan was first elected to the National Board in 2019.

MINUTES OF ANNUAL CONFERENCE 2021

Conference was held virtually over two 90-minute sessions on April 07 & 08 2022. Due to the on-going impact of the COVID-19 pandemic, it was not possible to hold an Annual Conference(AC) in 2021. AC 2021 was held within the 16-month timeframe as is permitted under the AI Ireland Constitution.

Plenary sessions included: a report to membership from our National Board focused on the work by both Al Ireland and the wider Al movement, our ongoing work on the global campaigns for greater vaccine access and equity, and on our on-gong work to end Direct Provision and our work on sex workers rights, and inputs on our dynamic programmes supporting our activists, including youth and student activism.

Our Honorary Treasurer, Tiarnan delivered a presentation on our finances and presented our 2021 Operational and our 2022 Headline Budget.

Conference heard powerful testimony from speakers with personal experience at our plenary sessions, namely:

Saleh Higazi, Head of Al's Jerusalem office and **Senator France Black**, long time campaigner on the rights of Palestinian people.

ELECTIONS

There were a total of seven positions open for election to the National Board. All seven positions were filled.

MOTIONS AND CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

On Thursday O7 April Conference considered a range of motions that had been put forward by membership. Conference decided as follows:

MOTION 1 - OPERATIONAL BUDGET 2021

Conference endorses the decision of the National Board to approve the organisational budget for 2021 as presented to conference.

MOTION 2 - HEADLINE OPERATIONAL BUDGET 2022

MOTION 3

Annual Conference supports those involved in peaceful protest against the military takeover of Sudan since October 2021 and remembers those who have lost their lives during the peaceful revolution in Sudan.

Conference endorses Amnesty International's calls for a prompt, independent, and impartial investigation to ensure accountability for the killings and other serious human rights violations allegedly committed by security forces. Authorities must investigate the fatal shootings of unarmed protesters, allow for this investigation to be internationally monitored, and hold those responsible to account.

Conference also endorses the call for all those who have been arbitrarily detained, following peaceful protests, to be immediately released.

MOTION 4

Amnesty International - Ireland Section runs an internship programme that offers work experience to those interested in a career in human rights. Currently, the internships are unpaid, although Amnesty offers a small stipend to cover travel and lunch costs. Internships are not an additional resource or an alternative to paid staff roles, rather they provide meaningful development opportunities for candidates who wish to pursue a career in human rights work.

However, an unpaid internship programme can mean that some candidates are unable to participate in the programme as they cannot afford to be without an income for six months. This is problematic on several fronts, but particularity from a diversity and inclusion perspective.

Conference requests that the National Board carry out a review of the current internship programme and examines the feasibility and desirability of introducing a paid internship programme at Amnesty International Ireland.
